

Community, Equality and Welsh Language Impact Assessment

Proposal to increase capacity of Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd

September 2021

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1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Governing Body of Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd is carrying out a formal consultation on a proposal to increase the capacity of Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd from 105 full time pupils to 126 full time pupils.
- 1.2 Should the Governing Body wish to implement the Proposal following the Formal Consultation, such implementation will be subject to Welsh Language and Community Impact Assessments.

2. National Context

- 2.1 The Welsh Government School Organisation Code 2013 (revised 2018) requires the proposer to conduct a Community Impact Assessment and a Welsh Language Impact Assessment when proposing changes to school organisation.
- 2.2 The School Organisation Code stipulates that proposers need to consider the impact that a proposal may have on local families and the local community, through preparation of a community impact assessment and the effect of the Welsh language through the preparation of a language impact assessment if any school affected provides teaching through the medium of Welsh.

3. Local Context

- 3.1 Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd is a Category 2 (bilingual) Voluntary Controlled school providing education for pupils aged 3-11 years old aligned with the Church in Wales in the Diocese of St Asaph.
- 3.2 Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd moved into their new school building in February 2020. The new school facility was built as part of Denbighshire County Council and Welsh Government's 21st Century Schools Band A Programme.
- 3.3 The new school has been built to provide enough space to accommodate all current pupils along with enough surplus places to accommodate future projected pupil numbers based on Pupil Level Annual School Census (PLASC) and projected numbers as a result of housing developments for an additional 63 Dwellings to be built in the village.

3.4 Since the opening of the new school site, pupil numbers have begun to rise and demand for places has resulted in the Denbighshire's school admissions department having to refuse pupils their 1st preference.

Community Use of Schools

3.5 One of the policies contained within the Framework relates to 'Community Use of Schools' and highlights DCC's commitment to community focused schools. The Governing Body will work closely with DCC to conduct the community impact assessments when considering changes to the schools capacity.

Promoting Bilingualism

3.6 The Framework also contains a policy on promoting bilingualism. The governing body recognises how important bilingualism is in 21st Century Wales. As a bilingual church school, we share DCC's aspiration for all children and young people to leave full time education being competent and confident using both Welsh and English languages. This aspiration is in accordance with the Welsh Government's vision for 'A Million Welsh Speakers by 2050'.

4. Background

- 4.1 DCC's Cabinet approved the Modernising Education Policy Framework in January 2009 to provide a platform to review existing school provision.
- 4.2 There was a commitment from DCC to provide a first class education for all children and young people in the county. As part of this commitment, the council agreed that modernising education provision was a priority because it recognises the importance of having school buildings, learning environments and resources that meet the needs of 21st century Wales.
- 4.3 Education provision in the county had to change because improvements in education could not be sustained without changes to the way education was provided.
- 4.4 Consideration has been given to the potential impact on the Welsh Language and on the local communities resulting from the Proposal.


Nearest suitable school

6.3 DCC admission policy does not use catchment areas when determining school admissions. Schools are simply referred to as the 'nearest suitable school' which takes into account language and faith based preferences. However

- parental preference means pupils can attend any school so long as there are places available.
- 6.4 In making this assessment, it is necessary to consider the other schools which the proposal may potentially impact and where pupils of Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd could attend. The list of potentially impacted schools have been determined based on their similar characteristics to Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn such as: similar capacity, deliver Welsh medium provision or church school provision.

6.5 The current Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd pupils live predominantly within 3 miles of the school site. The map below shows the spread of pupil locations (post code locations only, from June 2021 data, including nursery pupils).

6.9 Parent and teacher association

There is a parent and teacher association at the school which meets every termly, the meetings take place in English.

6.10 Additional provision

The additional school provision offered out of school hours is a daily breakfast club. There is no after school or Holiday Club offer at the school.

6.11 Childcare/ pre-school provision

The school also has a Cylch Meithrin [playgroup] which is located within the school building. The provision is run within the school `s Community Room .It currently opens for morning sessions. The playgroup is registered to take 19 pupils per session. Current numbers at June 2021 were up to 18 attending each day.

6.12 There are also private nursery/ day care provisions in the local area that provide Welsh and Bilingual provision.

6.15 Covid restrictions have meant that the school haven't been able to open up the hall to community activities since the opening of the new building in February 2020.

6.16 **Community Activities – other**

Neuadd Llanfair and Neuadd Pwllglas are used by a variety of groups for a range of community activities. These activities are delivered in Welsh and Bilingually.

7. Additional considerations set out in the Code

- 7.1 Although it is planned that the schools will increase its capacity the proposal will not have any impact on the current school building and how it is used as the school has sufficient space to accommodate the additional pupil numbers within the school building.
- 7.2 There are certain matters set out in the Code which the proposer should consider when assessing the impact of the proposal on the community and language. However, some of them apply only where a school is to be closed and its pupils will have to rely on existing alternative provision. Therefore for the reasons stated in **paragraph 7.1** above it is not relevant for the purposes of this document to consider:
 - a. whether other facilities in the immediate local or wider community will or could be enhanced in the event of closure;

- information about the facilities and services provided at any alternative school;
- information about the distance and travelling time involved in attending an alternative school;
- d. how parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and any facilities it may offer could be supported;
- e. information about any wider implications the changes would have on public transport provisions;
- f. information on wider community safety issues;
- g. information about standards in the Welsh language in the school and any alternatives;
- h. information about after school activities which provide additional opportunities to use Welsh in the school and any alternative school;
- i. whether it might be appropriate to provide additional after school facilities at any alternative school to further secure standards in the Welsh language; and
- i. how parents' and pupils' engagement with any alternative school and any specific language enhancement it offers could be supported.

The school and governing body may wish to consider as part of its future work how the school can ensure its presence is maintained in the community.

9. Summary of Equality Impact Assessment

- 9.1 It should be noted that attempting to ascertain the potential impact on equality from school organisation is a difficult undertaking.
- 9.2 Overall the impact from the assessment is positive. There are a number of impact considerations which the proposal has no impact on due to the nature of the proposal.
- 9.3 The main positives from the assessment are the increases in the number of places available in a bi-lingual church school to meet demand and encourage access, reduction in 1st preference refusals, decrease in nearest suitable school refusals and decrease in sibling refusals.

10. Welsh Language Impact Assessment

10.1 This impact assessment is to consider the potential impact on the Welsh language of the Proposal.

Census Data

10.2 The following data is taken from the 2011 Census and provides information on the proportion of Welsh speakers within the ward that Ysgol Llanfair Dyffryn Clwyd is located in.

11. Summary of Potential Impact on the Welsh Language

- 11.1 It should be noted that attempting to gauge the potential impact from the proposal on the Welsh language is a difficult undertaking.
- 11.2 The main positives emerging from the impact assessment is an increase in bilingual places for pupils which will support the increase in the use of Welsh language within the community. Providing an increase in capacity represents an opportunity to strengthen Welsh education in the area and as a result strengthen the Welsh language.
- 11.3 Conclusion: Overall the proposal would not have a negative impact on the Welsh language and the increase of bilingual provision places at the school could have a positive impact on the use of Welsh within the community.

13. Summary of Potential Impact on families and the local community

13.1 It should be noted that attempting to ascertain the potential impact from school organisation on families and the local community is a difficult undertaking.

- 13.2 The increase in capacity is to accommodate for predicted increases in pupil numbers based on the pupil projections and numbers anticipated from the new housing development in the village it is anticipated that the will be a minimal impact on the community.
- 13.3 Conclusion: The proposal will have a neutral impact on pupils, parents and their families. The increase proposed has considered impact on the local community, along with the demand for places.
- 13.4 As the proposal is not closing a school provision or significantly changing the current provision there should be no major impact on community activities.
- 13.5 Throughout the consultation period if there are any justified impacts noted the impact assessment will be reviewed and measures will be considered so that any impact is minimised.
